Overconfidence in one's opinions can sometimes make that person prideful, narrow-minded, and disrespectful of the beliefs of others. Believers should be able to listen to the views, concerns, and questions of others without lashing out in anger or pride.

Evangelism cannot be done without love and great respect. If there is no genuine care for the person, a Christian's words lose their impact and worth. The gospel is best presented through a believer's attitude and lifestyle—in random kindness to friends, strangers, and enemies and in having an unearthly joy and peace in circumstances that would normally cause anxiety or frustration.

True evangelism is much more than repeating key verses and doctrines; it's sharing pieces of yourself and being open, vulnerable, and honest so that others feel free to do the same. It's extending grace and patience where it's least deserved because we have received the same loving treatment from our Savior. It is only then that a Christian is spreading the gospel in its purest form. —HM
