

Given to yourself as well as to others, forgiveness prepares your heart for the transforming work of the Holy Spirit as He nurtures seeds of patience, humility, and spiritual understanding within you. Forgiveness equips you to learn from what happened in the past and then let go of it and look to the future with wiser, more experienced eyes.

God has forgiven you completely. Now forgive yourself. Allow His Spirit to lead you into visible, real-life holiness in His own way and in His own time. Remain with Him because no one has the power to be holy apart from God, who is holy.

By obeying His commandments, we're allowing Him to give us true and lasting freedom.

If you struggle with one of God's rules, why not talk to Him about it? Pour out your thoughts, and then let Him talk to you in the words of scripture and through the voice of mature Christian friends and advisers. Free yourself to really enjoy your life.
