


Silence. It can be hard to come by these days. But it's in the silence and stillness where you can find your way to God, to His presence, to a place where you can hear His still, small voice and feel His touch. Jeanne Guyon, the French mystic and author of *Experiencing the Depths of Jesus Christ*, advised people to "practice silent prayer for a long, uninterrupted period of time." For a person new to this idea, she suggested combining "spoken prayer with silent prayer." Below today's Bible verse are three different expressions Guyon said could be offered to the Lord—but they must be offered from the heart. See if one speaks to your inner spirit. Then take it with you as you enter the silence of heaven and come before your loving Lord.

And when he had opened the seventh seal, there was silence in heaven about the space of half an hour... And another angel came and stood at the altar, having a golden censer; and there was given unto him much incense, that he should offer it with the prayers of all saints.

"Oh my God, be my all! Let everything else be as nothing to me."

That means God will answer your prayers. And you put more power behind them when you expect God to answer in the affirmative—and go beyond what you'd imagined. Andrew Murray writes, "Beware in your prayers, above everything else, of limiting God, not only by unbelief, but by fancying that you know what He can do." That's powerful stuff.

So don't delay. Pray. Expect. And believe God will do more than you could ever ask.

What do you do when faced with the seemingly unconquerable? Pray, right? That's what King Jehoshaphat did when armies threatened to invade his kingdom. On his knees, he sought God's face and prayed for deliverance. He proclaimed his own helplessness, as well as his faith in God, saying, "We have no might against this great company that cometh against us; neither know we what to do: but our eyes are upon thee" (2 Chronicles 20:12). God responded by saying, "No problem. I've got this." The next day, the king told his people to just believe. Then he had his singers (praise) go out ahead of his army (strength), and "when they began to sing and to praise" (2 Chronicles 20:22), God went to work, defeating the enemy and leaving the spoils for Jehoshaphat's people.
